

Testing and Language Training Information for Students

Language Testing

After applying to the undergraduate program(s) of your choice and meeting the academic requirements for admission into the University of Ottawa, you will be invited to take the Express Pathway Language Test. This evaluation will consist of the following:

1. Writing test (60 minutes):

- a. Dates: Saturday, November 5 / Saturday, March 4
- b. Time: 8:00 am 9:00 am (CST: UTC +8)
- c. Delivery Mode: Zoom & MS Word Online

2. Speaking Test (30 minutes)

- a. Dates: Saturday, November 5 / Saturday, March 4
- b. Time: 9:30 am 12:30 pm (CST: UTC +8) *
- c. Delivery Mode: Zoom & MS Word Online

*We will contact you to schedule a 30-minute time slot within this scheduled period.

To take this test, you will need the following:

- 1. A reliable laptop or desktop computer equipped with webcam, microphone and headset or speakers;
- 2. Reliable internet access with an average broadband speed over 20 MBPS;
- 3. Designated workspace to minimize disruptions

Writing Test

For the **first stage** of the test, you will have 60 minutes to write a 300-word essay on a general topic. Here is how the test will be administered:

- One week prior to the test, you will receive a **link to Zoom**. You will be asked to join us at least 15 minutes before the start of the test.
- Once you arrive to take the test, you will be asked to show your identification (ID) to the test invigilators. Your identification must include a picture and your first and last name. You will need to have your camera on and to show your identification (ID) to the screen.
- Just before the start of the test you will receive a link to your writing test through the Zoom chat feature. The link will bring you to an **MS Word online document** that you will use to write your essay.
- You will have one hour to complete your essay.
- A staff member from the University of Ottawa will be available in the Zoom meeting room to help you.
- You must keep your camera on when completing the test.

Speaking Test

The **second stage** of the test will involve an oral interview that will last 15 to 20 minutes. Here is how the test will be administered.

- One week prior to the test, you will receive a **link to Zoom** (where you will have your interview) and your **interview time**.
- Your interview will last 15 to 20 minutes.
- Make sure you enter your zoom interview room at least **10 minutes** before the start of your interview. When the interviewers are ready to evaluate you, they will let you into the zoom interview room.
- Once you arrive to take the test, you will be asked to show your identification (ID) to the test invigilators. Your identification must include a picture and your first and last name. You will need to have your camera on and to show your identification (ID) to the screen.
- The interview will be given by two language instructors from the University of Ottawa. One instructor will speak with you while the other instructor will take notes.
- · You must keep your camera on when completing this test,

Language Training

If you meet the language admission requirement for the University of Ottawa Express Pathway Program, you will receive a conditional offer of admission to the University of Ottawa. We will then contact you to encourage you to enroll in the course **Accelerated Academic Bridging in English**, which will be offered online from **July 3 to August 25, 2023**. After successfully completing this course, you will be able to start your undergraduate studies in September 2023.

Appendix 1 Writing Test Information

For the writing test, your task will be to write a response of approximately 300 words. You will have 60 minutes to complete this task.

You will be asked to use only the MS Word Online document to develop your response. Use of outside resources such as other websites, dictionaries or translation tools will not be allowed.

Sample Question:

Children who are brought up in families that do not have large amounts of money are better prepared to deal with the problems of adult life than children brought up by wealthy parents. To what extent do you agree or disagree with this opinion?

You will be asked to give reasons for your answer and include any relevant examples from your own knowledge or experience.

Suggestions:

- 1. Read the prompt carefully and make sure you understand the question.
- 2. Spend a couple of minutes on brainstorming ideas and developing an outline.
- 3. Write approximately 300 words to answer all parts of the question in an essay format.
- 4. Organize your essay logically, with clear progression using linking phrases.
- 5. Do not use memorized language, phrases, or examples (Copying and pasting will result in failure).
- 6. Check your response carefully for grammar and word choice errors.

Minimum Required Performance:

To meet the **minimum requirements** for admission into the Express Pathway Program, your essay will have the following characteristics:

- Your intended meaning will be generally clear throughout the essay although grammatical and vocabulary errors may exist.
- You will be able to use simple sentences and basic vocabulary accurately, but you may have difficulty with complex sentences.
- Your main idea will be somewhat clear and there will be some evidence of a progression of ideas.

Appendix 2

Speaking Test Information

The speaking interview test will consist of three parts:

1. Familiar topic questions: In this part of the interview, you will be required to answer general questions on a range of familiar topics, such as family, hobbies, work, hometown, etc.

Sample familiar topic questions:

- a. Do you often watch TV?
- b. What sorts of things do you watch on TV?
- c. What is your favourite TV program?
- **2. Cue-card questions:** You will then be asked to talk about a particular topic. You will be given 1 minute to look at a cue card and prepare a response of approximately 2 minutes.

Sample cue-card questions: Describe a book you have recently read.

- a. What kind of book is it?
- b. What it is about?
- c. What sort of people would enjoy it?
- d. dExplain why you liked it.
- **3. Discussion questions:** In this final part of the speaking interview, you will answer additional questions about the topic in part 2 (cue-card questions). This will give you the opportunity to expand on your responses and discuss more complex ideas and issues.

Sample discussion questions:

- a. Is reading an essential part of your culture?
- b. What do people prefer these days: reading e-books or regular books? Why?
- c. What are some advantages and disadvantages of reading e-books?

Suggestions:

When taking this test, keep the following points in mind:

- 1. Be calm. Our examiners are very nice.
- 2. Speak clearly throughout the interview. Do not try to speak too fast to impress.
- 3. Make sure to listen carefully to understand the questions.
- 4. If you do not understand a question or part of a question, feel free to ask the examiner to repeat or rephrase the question.
- 5. Be mindful of time, especially for section 2.
- 6. Use linking words and phrases to increase cohesion and coherence within your responses.

Minimum Required Performance:

To meet the **minimum requirements** for admission into the Express Pathway Program, your performance will have the following characteristics:

- You will be able to understand most straightforward messages and maintain conversations on familiar topics.
- Most simple sentence structures you use in the discussion will be accurate although errors may sometimes interfere with communication.
- You will have adequate vocabulary to communicate on general and familiar topics.
- Your accent or mispronunciations may occasionally interfere with communication.


