Safety Sheet 3 – Emergency Showers

Consult the Ontario Occupational Health and Safety Act and its regulations for detailed information.

- 1. Emergency showers must be provided where a worker is exposed to a potential hazard of injury to the skin due to contact with a hazardous substance.
- 2. Instruct all employees, professors, students, volunteers and visitors of the location and proper use of emergency showers.
- 3. Emergency showers must be installed within 10 seconds of hazard and with an unobstructed travel path.
- 4. Emergency showers must be installed and used according to manufacturer's specifications.
- 5. Identify shower locations with highly visible sign.
- 6. Emergency showers must be easily accessible at all times.
- 7. Area around shower shall be well lit.
- 8. Emergency showers will operate with water supplied from the main cold water supply for each building. New installations will be served with tepid water.
- 9. Warm water (regular) showers will be provided to allow individuals to warm up once assistance has arrived. Warm water showers are located in some existing washroom facilities (D'Iorio, Gendron, etc.).
- 10. Alarms shall be connected to emergency showers (local and remote to Protection Services) to permit a quick response to an injured individual.
- 11. Wastewater from showers should not create a hazard.
- 12. Drains should be provided where feasible and/or required.
- 13. If drainage is provided, drain piping should be connected to the building's sewer system.
- 14. Emergency showers must receive full maintenance from Facilities **every 12 months** (flow, spray pattern, volume, valve, etc.). The records of these inspections must be kept.
- 15. When possible, construction and operation of emergency showers must meet or exceed the requirements of ANSI Z358.1-2014.
