Information on the program

Classics, now known as Greek & Roman Studies, offers a window on civilizations that still have much to teach us. While the study of the ancient world helps us to understand the foundations of the Western world, the program also gives us a chance to acquaint ourselves with

unfamiliar cultures. Discover Greek and Roman politics, culture and thought through courses in history, mythology, philosophy, ancient languages (Greek and Latin), literature, the history of theatre, the history of art and archaeology.

Admission requirements

- · High school diploma (or equivalent if you studied outside of Canada).
- · Meet a minimum grade point average.
- Meet the language requirements (French or English). Undergraduate admission requirements

First Year

During your first year, you will discover the most important periods and events of Greek and Roman history. You can also take your first steps in the ancient languages.

Meet an advisor at the Office of undergraduate studies in the winter to review your choice of courses.

Second Year

Already at this point you can begin to read the ancient sources in the original language. Take advantage of the services of the Academic GPS for help writing papers.

Discover the services of OLBI (Official Languages and Bilingualism Institute) to expand your skills in both English and French.

Third Year

Extend your skills in the analysis of literary and historical texts by choosing one of the courses with variable topics.

Put into practice your writing and analytical abilities as you produce your essays on literary and historical subjects and religious phenomena.

Fourth Year

Take part in advanced seminars, participate in learned discussions, and take on more advanced research in small groups.

Attend information sessions on the M.A. program and how to make a successful application for funding for graduate work.

Make the most of an enriching experience

Courses in small groups are offered in the first or second year, which give you the chance to get to know others who share your passion and who might turn into future colleagues.

Gain work experience on campus near to your classrooms with flexible hours, then the work-study system offers an ideal opportunity for this.

Find out about archaeological placements: they give you the chance to have hands-on experience by joining a team that is excavating an ancient site. Our students have worked (e.g.) in Greece, Spain, Italy and elsewhere.

Go to Europe or Asia for an organized study trip, guided by experienced professors. You will get to know both foreign cultures and students from other universities.

Apply for a \$1000 scholarship in the Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program (UROP) to deepen your knowledge of a particular subject and work with a professor of your choice.
