History Labs

Using a hands-on approach, based on primary sources, this course will introduce the students to the different aspects of historical research and enable them to understand the discipline at the university level.

Survey of the political, social and cultural evolution of Canada, from its origins to the present.

Introduction to Global History

A course of general interest focused on human migration and settlement, long-distance commercial and political connections, cultural exchanges, intellectual linkages, and social upheaval and conflict emerging in the modern world.

The Twentieth-Century World from 1945

A course of general interest which focuses on the search for security and independence in a post-war world dominated by super powers and globalization.

Historical events and trends in Southeast Asia from the 18th century to the Present.

HIS2300 A00 (3 units)

Global Environmental History

Daniel RÜCK

This course is an introduction to global environmental history. It draws from cross-disciplinary literature on a number of regions and time periods and sketches the history of human interactions with the environment.

HIS 2335 A00 (3 units)

Deciphering the Medieval Era: Western Europe from the 5th to the 15th Century

Caroline Prud'Homme

Study of the Middle Ages in Western Europe: its creation by historians, its interpretation by large audiences, and its specific features in the history of humanity.

HIS 2342 A00 (3 units)

Europe in the 20th Century

Nicolas LEPINE

Europe's role in the crises of the 20th century: democratic and totalitarian responses to the Great War (1914-1918), the Russian Revolution, the economic upheaval of the inter-war period, World War II, the division of post-war Europe, decolonization and the end of the European world hegemony, the European Community, and the collapse of the communist block since 1989.

HIS 3105 B00 (3 units)**From Source to Text**

Topic for Winter 2024 : Canadian Primary Source Lab

Historians extract useable information from often fragmented material created for various other purposes. This course will provide students with the tools needed to handle specific types of sources (textual, visual, oral or material) or introduce them to specific methods and approaches (such as geographic information system, quantitative methods, micro-history etc.) Topics will vary from section to section and the course can be repeated for credit if the content is different. Reserved for the students registered in the Honours, Joint Honours, Major in history.

The British Isles since the industrial revolution, focusing on the main trends of modern British society, from the height of its power in the Victorian age to its comparative decline in the 20th century.

HIS 3150 B00 (3 units)

Selected Topics in American History – *American Thought and Culture Since 1865* Heather MURRAY

Topic for Winter 2024: This course will explore some of the major trends in American thought and culture from the post-Civil War period through the 21st century, a period often perceived as embodying a shift from a "modern" sensibility to a "postmodern" one. In addition to exploring the works of canonical American intellectuals and artists, we will focus on close readings of an array of cultural and intellectual expression from diverse primary sources, among them photography, film, television, advertisements, music, and social science sources. We will wed these to broader historical contexts, such as social relations, political history, and global arts and ideational movements, while exploring why it is that certain beliefs, forms of cultural expression, and representation took hold at particular moments in American history. Some of our central movements and themes include social realism; Darwinism; pragmatism; progressivism; American modernity, especially the development of American film and modern art; the evolution of American liberalism and responses to ideologies, particularly communism and fascism; authenticity and existentialism; radicalism and conservatism; consumer culture; and postmodernism as both a cultural and philosophical movement. From a methodological standpoint, this course aims to explore and create a cultural history that pays equal attention to ideas as it does to the arts, and an intellectual history that pays equal attention to the arts as it does to ideas.

HIS 3300 A00 (3 units)

Conflict and Convergence: Canada and the United States since 1776
Damien-Claude BÉLANGER

Explores the history of Canadian-American relations. Topics include diplomacy, economic integration, cross-border migration, and cultural convergence.

HIS 3301 A00 (3 units)

Selected Topics in History Across Borders—Human Rights History

Meredith TERRETTA

Topic for Winter 2024 : Using specific case studies and primary documents, and with particular emphasis on transnational activism linking the Global North and South, students will probe the strategies that various postwar activists and rights claimants employed to make human rights protections matter despite the strictures of national sovereignty and non-interference characteristic of the Cold War era. Students will also consider what lasting effects this period had on the human rights movement as a whole.

This course explores problems and issues that cut across spatial, temporal, and disciplinary boundaries. Study of historical connections and processes. Examination of various national experiences within a transregional context. Coursework and assignments will provide students concrete opportunities to practice interdisciplinary learning and research.

HIS 3314 A00 (3 units)

The Second World War

Serge DURFLINGER

An examination of the relationship between society, diplomacy and warfare from 1939 to 1945, incorporating North American, European and Asian perspectives.

More detailed description: This course surveys the dominant themes in the history of the Second World War, including its origins, grand strategy, military operations, the human experiences of war, and the war's political and economic impacts. This course will initiate students to the war's major events and its overarching structure – in other words, the “big picture.” This is the principal learning outcome. However, many other topics explored only briefly in class lectures, such as espionage, technology, or the “home front,” can form the basis of some excellent essay topics.

Ways in which history is shaped by governments, public institutions, the information and entertainment media, and artists for presentation to the general public.

HIS 3505 A00 (3 unités)
De la source au texte - Jeanne d'Arc, de l'hérétique à la sainte
Kouky FIANU

Sujet de l'hiver 2024 : Active sur la scène politique pendant deux ans seulement (1429-1431), Jeanne d'Arc est l'une des figures marquantes de l'histoire occidentale. Présentée tour à tour comme prophète, hérétique, sainte ou folle, son mythe a traversé les siècles, porté par différents mouvements religieux, culturels ou politiques. Ce cours a pour objectif de comprendre comment et pourquoi ont été créées ces différentes facettes de Jeanne (textes, images, représentations, films), quels usages on en a fait au cours des siècles et comment les analyser. Ensemble, nous étudierons la façon dont différentes périodes et divers lieux ont exploité la figure de Jeanne d'Arc, ou comment l'on est passé tout au long des siècles de la « source » au « texte ».

Les historiens retirent des informations utilisables de matériaux souvent fragmentaires créées pour diverses autres fins. Ce cours vise à donner aux étudiants les outils nécessaires à l'analyse de catégories spécifiques de sources (textuelles, visuelles, orales ou matérielles) ainsi qu'à les introduire à des méthodes et approches spécifiques (comme, par exemple, le système d'information géographique, l'histoire quantitative, la micro-histoire etc.). Les sujets varieront d'une section à l'autre et le cours pourra être suivi plusieurs fois pour crédits si le contenu est différent. HIS 4301 B00 (3 units)

Selected Topics in History Across Borders –

Topic for Winter 2024 : The Global Cold War

Nicolas LEPINE

In this thematically organized course, students will further analyze problems and issues that cut across spatial, temporal, and disciplinary boundaries. Mastery of knowledge of historical connections and processes that span regions and fields of study, from an interdisciplinary perspective. Course may be repeated if themes vary.

HIS 4361 A00 (3 units)

Selected Topics in American History--Media and Politics in America from Andrew Jackson to Donald Trump

Topic for Winter 2024 : *This course will explore the role played by media in American politics from the early republic until today. We will follow a thematic approach centered on different types of media and technologies to explore the evolution of communications between American politicians and the electorate. We will look at how the printing press, radio, television, cinema, 24-hour news networks, the internet and social media impacted the relationship between the American people and their elected officials.*

HIS 4760 A00 (3 unités)

Thèmes choisis en histoire du Canada – 1838-2002 : Dix moments clés en politique québécoise Peter BISCHOFF

Sujet de l'hiver 2024 : *De l'imposition d'un Conseil spécial aux Bas-Canadiens, en 1838, à la conclusion de la «Paix des braves», en 2002, en passant par l'élargissement du droit de vote des femmes, les interventions du clergé catholique, la Révolution tranquille, les États généraux du Canada français et la rude bataille linguistique des années 1980, etc., nous examinerons dix moments qui marquèrent la politique au Québec.*

Au cours de la première moitié de chaque rencontre, le professeur dresse un portrait du sujet abordé. Dans la seconde partie du cours, nous discuterons et examinerons des textes présélectionnés sous toutes leurs coutures.

En partant d'interrogations soulevées par l'un ou l'autre des textes passés en revue, les étudiants réaliseront deux enquêtes dans les sources primaires pour comprendre de première main les sujets débattus.

HIS 4100 C00 (3 units)

Seminar in History Across Borders – *What is Human Nature?*

Heather MURRAY

Topic for Winter 2024 : What is "human nature" and can it be approached historically? Why do so many observers and commentators, not to mention professors and students, reach for the idea of human nature as an explanatory force, often to suggest that humans are basically rotten or conversely that humans are basically good? How has "human nature" come to attain the status of knowledge? This course will explore the concept of human nature over time in relation to evolution and the human/animal relationship; prehistoric "man" and the impetus to speak in the idiom of "man" as a universal subject; wartime and revolutionary contexts; communism, capitalism and political experiments that aimed to reshape human nature; modernity, psychology and experiments with new styles of personhood; and psychological and scientific experiments that have posited grandiose claims about human nature. The readings will be multi-disciplinary, and particularly focused in intellectual history, the history of science and the social sciences.

In this seminar, students will investigate complex problems and issues that cut across spatial, temporal, and disciplinary boundaries, drawing on a variety of theoretical approaches. Students will produce original work, using primary and archival sources reflecting the interdisciplinary nature of the course.

It will outline the impact of war on Canadian society and examine the influence of war on the development of Canadian nationalism. Canadian military operations and the personal experiences of war will also be explored. To what extent did Canada participate in these world wars and why? What were the personal, familial, and societal consequences? How did these wars fundamentally change Canada and shape the country's domestic policies and world role?*

Seminar in European History – The English East India Company

Topic for Winter 2024 : This seminar considers recent historiographical debates and discussions about the emergence, expansion and eclipse of the English (British) East India Company. As such they address the period from 1600 until the later 1850s and explores the crucial role the East India Company played in Britain's rise from a minor European state to a global imperial power. A background knowledge the field and subject-matter is essential.

Sujet de l'hiver 2024 : *La France du XVIIIe siècle fut le théâtre de nombreux débats où la justice était souvent remise en question, que ce soit à travers des publications (causes célèbres, factums) ou des appels à la réforme du système judiciaire. Ce séminaire examinera le fonctionnement de la justice au siècle des Lumières dans la perspective genrée des justiciables et analysera les débats pour en dégager les principales critiques envers la justice.*
