## **Appendix: Community Involvement Activities**

## **List of Eligible activities:**

Community involvement activities may take place in a variety of settings, including businesses, not-for-profit organizations, public sector institutions (including hospitals), and information settings. Below is a list of community involvement activities that are considered acceptable.

Eligible activities may include an event or activity designed to be of benefit to the community and/or supports a not-for-profit agency, institution or foundation that conforms to the ethical standards of the University of Ottawa and the Ontario Ministry of Education.

The following list provides examples of activities that, if within the **intent and spirit of community involvement**, are suitable for completion of the community involvement

requirement. Unapproved activities cannot be commenced until permission has been granted by the school.

If a student proposes to undertake an activity that is *not* on the school or host school board's list of approved activities, the principal will determine whether the student's proposed activity is acceptable, in consultation with the appropriate supervisory officer. If the activity is acceptable, the principal must keep a copy of the approval on file. (The principal is not required to give approval of activities that are on the school's list of approved activities.)

The principal will determine whether the student has met the community involvement requirement, and, if so, will indicate on the Ontario Student Transcript that the student has completed the requirement.

## List of Ineligible activities:

The ministry has developed a list of activities that may not be chosen as community involvement activities. These are referred to as ineligible activities. An ineligible activity is an activity that:

- is a requirement of a class or course in which the student is enrolled (e.g., cooperative education portion of a course, job shadowing, work experience)
- takes place during the time allotted for the instructional program on a school day. However, an activity that takes place during the student's lunch breaks or "spare" periods is permissible
- takes place in a logging or mining environment, if the student is under sixteen years of age
- takes place in a factory, if the student is under fifteen years of age
- takes place in a workplace other than a factory, if the student is under fourteen years of age and is not accompanied by an adult
- would normally be performed for wages by a person in the workplace
- involves the operation of a vehicle, power tools, or scaffolding
- involves the administration of any type or form of medication or medical procedure to other persons
- involves handling of substances classed as "designated substances" under the Occupational Health and Safety Act
- requires the knowledge of a tradesperson whose trade is regulated by the provincial government
- involves banking or the handling of securities, or the handling of jewellery, works of art, antiques, or other valuables
- consists of duties normally performed in the home (i.e., daily chores) or personal recreational activities
- involves activities for a court-ordered program (e.g., community-service program for young offenders, probationary program)

## **Community Involvement Record**

Students may begin to accumulate the required community involvement hours beginning in the summer after they complete Grade 8. Before beginning any activity, ensure that it is identified on the list of approved activities found above. If the activity does not appear on the eligible list, please obtain approval from your school principal before starting the activity. Activities not on the approved list cannot be commenced unless permission has been granted by the school.
