

Dr. Mary Naciuk



2021 Award Winners

Dr. Alison Eyre

Award: Regional Physician of the Year - OCFP 2021

In recognition of Dr. Eyre's Advocacy Efforts. Dr. Eyre fought the 2012 cuts to refugee health care and worked with children's care providers to research reducing barriers to care for vulnerable children. She has been a teacher and a mentor to countless medical students and Family Medicine

residents. Dr. Eyre was awarded the Jim Ruderman Academic Family Medicine Leadership Award in 2016 and continues to provide leadership at a regional level. She is co-chair of the Champlain Community of Family Practice, a group with an aim to unite the voice of family physicians leading health care reform in the Champlain region and is a member of the "Kids Come First" health team that aims to improve care for all children in the Champlain region.

Dr. Jonathan Fitzsimon

Award: Glenn Sawyer Service Award - OMA

In recognition of Dr. Fitzsimon's role in Bringing Healthcare to a Community in Need. Dr. Fitzsimon is the recipient of the OMA Community Service Award for his role in helping set up the VTAC, a 24/7 pandemic healthcare service that provides virtual family physician assessments to residents who do not

have a family physician or cannot access their family physician, in-home assessments by community paramedics, remote monitoring, and COVID-19 testing (i.e. via drive-thru clinics). Dr. Fitzsimon is moving the project along the patient medical home principles to solve a large equity gap in Canadian healthcare. His goal is to provide accessible high quality primary care to all rural and remote Canadians.

Dr. Kevin Pottie

Award: Researcher of the year award - CFPC

In recognition of Dr. Pottie's outstanding International Recognized Contribution to Research in Refugee Health and Equity Implementation. An Ian McWhinney Research Chair in Family Medicine at

Western University, Dr. Pottie was instrumental in spearheading CSIH's Pathways to Global Health, serving on the Canadian College of Family Practitioner's global health committee and leading the refugee health service-learning programs. He made outstanding contributions to the research excellence of the GRADE Working Group. His research has inspired refugee guidelines in Ireland, Australia, the USA and DYNAMED App, and has transformed refugee care. He applied these methods to the development of guidelines for the homeless health field. Dr. Pottie was appointed to the Global Society of Refugee Health, and was selected for a global leadership role with the World Health Organization and International Organization of Migration.

Dr. Doug Archibald, PhD

Award: Best poster – DIME Meredith Marks Day

Dr. Archibald is a health professions education researcher. His research interests are in educational technology and program evaluation. He is currently conducting work on projects involving patient engagement in postgraduate and continuing professional development, curriculum renewal and education research using virtual reality, the electronic medical record and other related technologies such as eConsult, and the Canadian Primary Care Information Network. Dr. Archibald has recently co-edited a special issue of the "Journal of Continuing Education" in the Health Professions on patient engagement, and written a chapter on program evaluation in the international textbook, "How to do Primary Care Educational Research: A Practical Guide", which is part of the WONCA Family Medicine Series.

2021 Award Winners

Dr. Sohil Rangwala

Award: Best poster - DIME Meredith Marks Day

As a full-time academic family doctor, Dr. Rangwala provides comprehensive primary care to patients and has an interest in HIV primary care. He has a passion for medical education and mentorship, as well as resident and faculty wellness. Some of his scholarly interests are focused on

medical education and selection. Dr. Rangwala is a current recipient of a PRIME grant, working with Dr. Ed Seale to develop and pilot a dossier review tool to improve interrater reliability when scoring files, increase standardization of the file review process, and ultimately lead to the selection of the best candidates for their program.

Dr. Parisa Rezaiefar

Award: Best Oral Presentation - DIME Meredith Marks Day

In recognition of Dr. Rezaiefar's Oral Presentation for Research in Education at Meredith Marks Day. As a Fellow with DIME, Dr. Rezaiefar's has demonstrated a keen interest in medical education and has focused on different aspects of curriculum development. Through her research, she has identified an area of unmet need and is developing innovative methods for teaching procedural skills in women's health at the postgraduate level. It is anticipated that this will have relevance across all post-graduate training

Dr. Peggy Kleinplatz

programs in Canada and for CPD.

Awards: Consumer Book Award – Society for Sex Therapy & Research, and Distinguished Sexual and Gender Health Revolutionary Award

Since 1983, Dr. Kleinplatz has been teaching Human Sexuality at the University of Ottawa. She has edited four books, and been the winner of the AASECT Book Award. Dr. Kleinplatz's fifth book received the 2021 Consumer Book Award from the Society for Sex Therapy and Research. In 2015, Dr. Kleinplatz received the Professional Standard of Excellence Award from the American Association of Sexuality Editors, Counsellors and Therapists. Dr. Kleinplatz's current research focuses on optimal sexual experience, with a particular interest in sexual

health in the elderly, disabled and marginalized populations.

Dr. Frank-Dietrich Knoefel

Award: Bruyère Partners in Excellence Award-Physician Excellence

In recognition of Dr. Knoefel's contribution to Research Programs in Memory Care and Dementia Prevention. Dr. Knoefel's research supports patients and caregivers through a dementia diagnosis; it is about technology, the aging brain, and how to connect them. He helped create the smart apartment in Bruyère, which has become an AGE-WELL national innovation hub a.k.a. the SAM3 (Sensors and Analytics to Monitor Memory and Mobility). It has advanced the development of sensor systems that address mobility and memory challenges among seniors and focuses on smart technologies that monitor their health and wellbeing. Dr. Knoefel's research collaborations include clinical drug trials with Bruyère to improve brain function, and memory collaborative research with uOttawa linking researchers with clinicians to make a bigger difference in understanding brain changes as we age.

DFM Faculty Award Winners

Dr. Marie-Josée Klett

Award: Undergrad Educator of the Year

Dr. Klett is the recipient of the Undergraduate Educator of the Year Award, which is presented annually to a member of the teaching staff who has demonstrated outstanding performance in their teaching, in particular in the development of innovative teaching material and methods, courses, and programs of study, and for their interpersonal skills. Dr. Klett is a family physician and sport medicine physician who

organizes the musculoskeletal Physician Skills Development Program for the undergraduate francophone stream. She has led many other DFM musculoskeletal teaching sessions and her teaching evaluations and colleague comments describe her work as "routinely demonstrating a wealth of skill, knowledge, experience, passion and creativity."

Dr. Rita Hafizi

Award: Undergrad Educator of the Year
In recognition of being an exceptional Preceptor and Physician Role Model. Dr. Hafizi

provides undergraduate students crucial support by helping them navigate career choices and receive hands-on skills development learning opportunities. Dr. Hafizi fosters respect and engenders trust by allowing students a level of independence when assessing her patients, and being accessible for guidance. She uses formal and informal teaching methods, and leads by example by being a kind and empathetic family physician and

patient advocate. Dr. Hafizi helped to develop an Isolation Curriculum for students who came in contact with or developed Covid-19 symptoms, enabling them to continue their learning. Feedback from the family medicine bootcamp was that Dr. Hafizi is compassionate and dedicated with a remarkable ability to connect with the students.

Dr. Anna Wilkinson Award: Scholarly Achievement

In recognition of Dr. Wilkinson's Research and Scholarly Work in the Domain of Knowledge Translation at the DFM. Dr. Wilkinson contributes vastly to oncology patient care as a family physician and is the Program Director for the PGY3 Family Practice Oncology program. She has

published a national "Breast cancer survivorship" tool in the Canadian Family Physician and will be publishing a series of "oncology briefs." Dr. Wilkinson has delivered national level (Family Medicine Forum) presentations on how to care for oncology patients. She supervises residents, teaches in the department, and delivers scholarly and evidence based academic day teaching. Dr. Wilkinson has created a learning environment, running regular morbidity and mortality rounds, helping family physicians and residents to continuously improve quality.

Dr. Gary Viner

Award: Scholarlu Achievement

In recognition of his long-standing Scholarly Contributions to the Department. Dr.

Viner was instrumental in the department's transition to a competency-based curriculum. He developed a systematic approach to collating formative feedback using a daily field note evaluation tool

integral to revamping the process to evaluate residents and the program. Dr. Viner has been awarded three significant grants to advance research in assessment and evaluation. He contributes as an abstract reviewer for national and international conferences, a grant reviewer for the Faculty of Medicine, and a journal article reviewer for national medical periodicals. Dr. Viner has 21 peer-reviewed publications with some cited internationally, and 21 conference publications. Recognition through numerous awards is a testament to Dr. Viner's commitment to excellence in teaching and education.

Dr. Farhad Motamedi

Award: Outstanding Faculty

In recognition of being a truly Model Leader. Dr. Motamedi has demonstrated exceptional interpersonal skills. He fosters a positive teach culture and helps build both personal and team resilience. He keeps everyone functioning, instilling a new sense of purpose, particularly during the pandemic. He creates a professional atmosphere with patients, staff and nurses, engendering the trust and confidence of his team. Dr. Motamedi is a key mentor and teacher, helming a large teaching unit, fostering a culture of learning by supporting a professional learning and teaching environment, encouraging residents to present at CPD courses and helping them to further their academic teaching skills. Dr. Motamedi leads by example, perseverance and dedication by being a master clinician. Through his work ethic, skill, and high standards of care. Dr. Motamedi inspires others to achieve.

Dr. Lina Shoppoff

Award: Outstanding Faculty

In recognition of being a Passionate and Dedicated Leader. Dr. Shoppoff has spearheaded the development of many programs, working tirelessly to unify the francophone and anglophone streams for equality of learning. She has enhanced programs through social

accountability, developed gaming programs, and improved how to deliver topics to learners at the pre and clerkship levels. She developed the first Bootcamp for incoming first year students so they could see what the FM has to offer before entering a classroom. Dr. Shoppoff's attention to detail has improved the exam database – she oversaw and improved the writing of new exam questions. Dr. Shoppoff was instrumental in getting the Covid-19 curriculum off the ground when virtual delivery was required, by adding lecture sessions from Interprofessional Team Members, which showed a real collaboration with FM physicians.

Dr. Christiane Kuntz

Mentorship Award

In recognition of Dr. Kuntz's Impact as a Mentor. Dr. Kuntz has mentored countless residents and faculty members. She has been known by those that she mentors as being her "medical children," an incredible testament to the dedication and leadership she brings to her

role as a mentor for all the community residents and for those who rotate through Women's Health clinics and the PGY3 Women's Health residents, who benefit from such one-on-one mentoring and life coaching. As noted by one former resident: "I wouldn't be where I am today without her." – Dr. Bradley

Dr. David Tobin Mentorship Award

In Recognition of Dr. Tobin's role as a Mentor. Throughout his career while in various leadership roles, Dr. Tobin has demonstrated a commitment to teaching, and is dedicated to fostering an environment of compassion and wellness for all members of the medical community. His teaching evaluations consistently highlight his empathy, his positivity, and his ability to connect with learners. Medical students and residents describe Dr. Tobin as a mentor who is always approachable and available to help with any concerns. He is acknowledged as "dad" to all residents. Dr. Tobin spearheaded the resilience committee and website on a volunteer basis, and he is the newly minted mentorship director, with an academic approach to initiating and evaluating a new program.

Dr. Lindsay Bradley Educational Leadership & Teaching

In recognition of Dr. Bradley's outstanding performance in Teaching Outside of the Clinical Unit. Dr. Bradley is a primary care sport medicine physician at the Carleton's Sport Medicine Clinic and has been the team physician for countless teams. Her commitment outside of the clinical unit is exceptional. She coordinates the PGY3 programs and is a leader in converting the programs to "competency-based" assessment systems. Dr. Bradley has co-authored highly cited position statements on concussion, is currently Program Chair of the OMA's Section on Sport and Exercise Medicine, and a representative on the Canadian Concussion Collaborative. Dr. Bradley is also chair of the Communications and Adaptive Physical Activity committees of the Canadian Academy of Sport and Exercise Medicine (CASEM). She advocates for athletes' mental health by helping FM residents execute scholarly projects on "exercise prescription" and website and communication tools for physicians, focused on exercise teaching.

Dr. Denice Lewis
Educational Leadership & Teaching

In recognition of Dr. Lewis's contribution to Innovative Curriculum Development. Dr. Lewis has contributed significantly to shaping the delivery and renewal of curriculum initiatives that support the Family Medicine Residency Program, such as co-designing and implementing a

curriculum quality improvement review process, and creating, piloting and implementing a behavioural medicine simulation curriculum. This year, in alignment with the Faculty of Medicine's social accountability mandate to address anti-racist curriculum gaps, Dr. Lewis has secured grant funding from the eCampus Ontario Visual Learning Strategy to develop and design anti-racist online learning modules as part of this residency program. This program is leading the way to create anti-racist curriculum which will be integrated and shared across Canada in order to advance medical education.

Dr. Hanif Charania Award: Clinical Preceptor

In recognition of being an Exemplary Preceptor. Dr. Charania supports students' learning interests and objectives and provides timely, constructive clinical feedback. Dr. Charania shows authentic consideration and interest in supporting students' training such as organizing training in a

student's area of interest. With reduced occupancy during Covid-19, Dr. Charania ensured that a mentor was available if he was not in the clinic, which ensured and increased learning opportunities for students to mentor with additional physicians. Those mentoring under him expressed immense gratitude and privilege in having someone like Dr. Charania to guide them through this journey.

Dr. Stefan de Laplante

Award: Clinical Preceptor

In recognition of being a Model Preceptor. Dr. de Laplante is a role model for learners throughout the DFM, demonstrating educational leadership well beyond any assigned leadership roles. He is a popular clinical preceptor and mentor for medical students and residents, with an

aptitude for helping learners prepare for clerkship. Dr. de Laplante excels as a leader: he presented as an invited speaker on "mentorship myths" at the 2020 DFM retreat; he is an advocate for francophone medical education and francophone content in the medical school curriculum; he has facilitated francophone activities and networking opportunities for learners at the provincial and national levels and mentored residents in their scholarly work.

Faculty of Medicine Awards of Excellence Winners

Dr. Christiane Kuntz

Award: Clinical Mentor of the Year

In recognition of being an excellent Clinician, an Educator and Advancing Women's Healthcare. Dr.

Kuntz is a sought-after community-based preceptor in the Postgraduate residency program and has trained over 35 residents throughout her career. Since 1997, Dr. Kuntz has been in a DFM

leadership role as the Director of Women's Health; is a national speaker on women's health clinical skills, presenting yearly at CPD programs and delivering simulated workshops; and integrated into the DFM program specialty experiences (women's health and gynecology). She founded the Women's Health PGY3 Enhanced Skills Program with the DFM. Twice weekly, Dr. Kuntz runs a menopause clinic where residents acquire hands-on learning opportunities. Many former trainees have integrated leadership positions into their careers, which is a testament to Dr. Kuntz' mentorship qualities.

Dr. Marjorie Pomerleau

Prix: Promotion de La Francophonie

La Dre. Pomerleau est une membre estimée de notre département depuis 2017, et occupe actuellement un poste de leadership en tant que Directrice du Programme et de l'Unité d'Enseignement Montfort, à titre de professeure adjointe. Dre. Pomerleau se consacre à l'amélioration de la qualité et de l'équité

des possibilités d'enseignement offertes aux stagiaires en médecine familiale et aux étudiants en médecine à l'Hôpital Montfort. L'engagement et le dévouement de la Dre Pomerleau visant à offrir de meilleures possibilités de formation en milieu francophone aux étudiants et résidents en médecine s'inscrivent dans la priorité stratégique de la Faculté de médecine de faire progresser la francophonie, en enrichissant notre programme bilingue de résidence en médecine familiale dans la capitale nationale.

Dr. Lyne Pitre Prix de Distinction des Diplômés - Prix de Leadership Exceptionnel En reconnaissance du leadership de la Dre. Pitre et de son investissement dans la promotion de la langue

française au sein de la faculté de médecine. Dre. Pitre a dévoué sa carrière universitaire à l'amélioration des programmes d'études en français et s'est vue décernée, en décembre 2021, la médaille de l'Ordre de la Pléiade de la Section de l'Ontario de l'Assemblée parlementaire de la Francophonie (APF) pour sa contribution exceptionnelle envers la Francophonie Ontarienne. Pédagogue passionnée, Dre. Pitre est la co-fondatrice de l'ESFAM (Équipe de Santé Familiale Académique Montfort) et créatrice de l'unique programme de résidence de la faculté de médecine en Français utilisé à l'hôpital Monfort. Elle est égaleemnt à l'origine de l'expansion de la cohorte des résidents R1 et a formé plus de 200 médecins de famille francophones. Ses ateliers "Préceptoriat 101 et 201", enseignés à 70 précepteurs francophones apportent une aide au recrutement, la formation de nouveaux précepteurs cliniques et l'enrichissement de leurs connaissances. Dre Pitre est la détentrice de nombreux prix et récompenses pour sa contribution exceptionnelle dans l'enseignement de la médecine et la défense de la place du français dans la communauté médicale.

Dr. Kay-Anne Haykal
Award: Early Career Researcher of the Year – Innovation and Education
In recognition of Dr. Haykal's contributions and the Impact of her Research Program focused on
Wellness in the Undergraduate Medical Education Program. Dr. Haykal has

led the development of resilience, wellness and mLIFE curriculums and a peer support program. She leads a research project on wellness that includes mandatory wellness assessments of 1st and 3rd year medical students. The development of a wellness check during Covid-19 was significant as it identifies major risk factors for students and ensures appropriate supports are in place. Other research projects focus on interventions to promote medical trainee help seeking for mental health concerns. The results will be applied to gain knowledge on gaps in medical training and change the culture for help seeking behaviour.

Dr. Amy Hsu

Award: Early Career Researcher of the Year –

Public Health and Epidemiology

In recognition of Dr. Hsu's contribution to a Diverse and Multidisciplinary Research Program. Dr.

Hsu's recent research has had national and international impact, contributing to knowledge about the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic on older adults living in long-term care homes. She is the PI on a pan-Canadian grant funded by the Covid-19 Immunity Task Force. This past year, Dr. Hsu's research resulted in publications being accessible from LTCCovid.org, read by 100,000+ users worldwide, cited by 50 peer-reviewed articles and policy documents. Her innovative research uses accelerometer data and a machine learning approach to predict future incidences of disease

Her innovative research uses accelerometer data and a machine learning approach to predict future incidences of disease and mortality; it also uses AI to build a vaccine education chatbot. Dr. Hsu has research collaborations with a national network of researchers to produce vital evidence to support the long-term-care sector through the remainder of this pandemic.

Dr. Marie-Helene Chomienne

Award: International and Global Health Award
In recognition of Dr. Chomienne's accomplishments as a primary care, interdisciplinary researcher,
with a focus on minority and Francophone minority health in Ontario, primary health care, psychology

in primary care and world health (mother-child health). Dr. Chomienne has received numerous research

grants, has many scientific publications, and contributed to the knowledge of primary care issues for francophones in minority settings, which includes teletreatment, validating a tool for depression in men, a scaling up project for francophone minority language, and a study on the obstetrical pathway of francophone African women at the Montfort. In 2020, Dr. Chomienne was awarded the "Chaire de Recherche en Francophonie Internationale et Santé de l'Immigrant ou du Réfugié d'Afrique Francophone Subsaharienne".

Dre. Manon Denis-Leblanc

Prix de l'ambassadeur du français en médecine Jacques-Boulay Médecins francophones du Canada
